We never stop learning and it is always exciting to implement new systems to assist in our mission.

Below is a brief rundown of LBK Community's activity for the first quarter of 2024 (January to March). We're making progress, although it's slow and steady. 263 cases were created in first quarter. 139 of which were crated in January. 32% of these cases have been resolved. 65% are in open status. 3% are unresolved.

In first quarter, we generated 177 referred cases. The median time of referred case acceptance: 3.6 days. Fantastic!


